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Introduction

You can think of Florida's [SARnet](#) statewide repeater network as a "mega horn" for ham radio nerds. Imagine you're in the caboose of a loose-knit motorcycle caravan stretching 200 miles across the Panhandle on your way to/from Sturgis. Amateur radio operators in your caravan could stay in touch using *any* SARnet repeater that broadcasts to *all* SARnet repeaters across the state.

There's just one problem: SARnet's [website & charts](#) lack ease-of-use. Sure, you can download a [Chirp](#) file from [RepeaterBook](#) and upload it to your mobile unit, *but then what?*

[Playground Amateur Radio Club](#) will show how to use Chirp, scissors, tape, and 3x5 index cards to improve mobile amateur radio on Florida's interstates & turnpike.

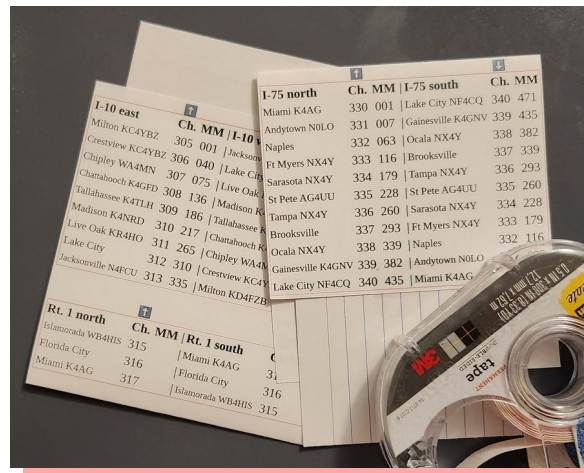
Instructions

Print out the *next* page and grab your scissors

Cut out each interstate, fold it in half at the green dotted line, and slide it over a 3x5 or 4x6 index card. You can tape or laminate or staple it to the card as you wish. We won’t judge you!

Your index cards will make it simple as you travel the interstates or turnpike. Select the channel covering the mile marker where you entered the highway, and press your channel  or  button at each suggested mile marker. *(See above if you want to suggest better mile markers.)*

Hint: Use the  button when the mile markers are going up.



Add the **parc_sarnet_v102.csv** Chirp file to your device

SARnet channels reside in the **300-349 range**. We **strongly** recommend you download & save a copy of your device’s memory channels before you make any modifications. Please make sure your device is [compatible](#) before using Chirp.

Yaesu and RT Systems software users

Use your favorite text editor (*not* a word processor) to open both **parc_sarnet_v102.csv** and the included **Yaesu_RT.header** file. Replace the *header* line in the SARnet file with the line in the header file, then “File/Save as” to a new filename. You can then “File/Import” the new SARnet file.

Caution: configure Yaesu devices using Yaesu’s or RT Systems’ software, *not* Chirp’s software.

Technical notes

SARnet channels begin at 300 to avoid low-number channels that people tend to use. We started at “3” hundred because your 3 button probably says “D-E-F” (“F”lorida, get it?)

Each channel in the Chirp file specifies “,S,” to *skip scanning* by default. You can change it if you wish.

The Chirp file incorporates duplicate entries where routes intersect. There’s also a special case for I-95 at Rt. 1 to/from Key West so you can keep clicking the  or  button.

The Chirp file leaves some channels blank for future SARnet repeaters. If a new repeater comes online — and yes, that’s an “if” — it will only impact channel numbers assigned to that route.

Let’s address one small elephant in the room: sarnetfl.com doesn’t use a consistent acronym, so we settled on the first sentence of their home page where it begins “The Statewide Amateur Radio Network (SARnet) is...”
